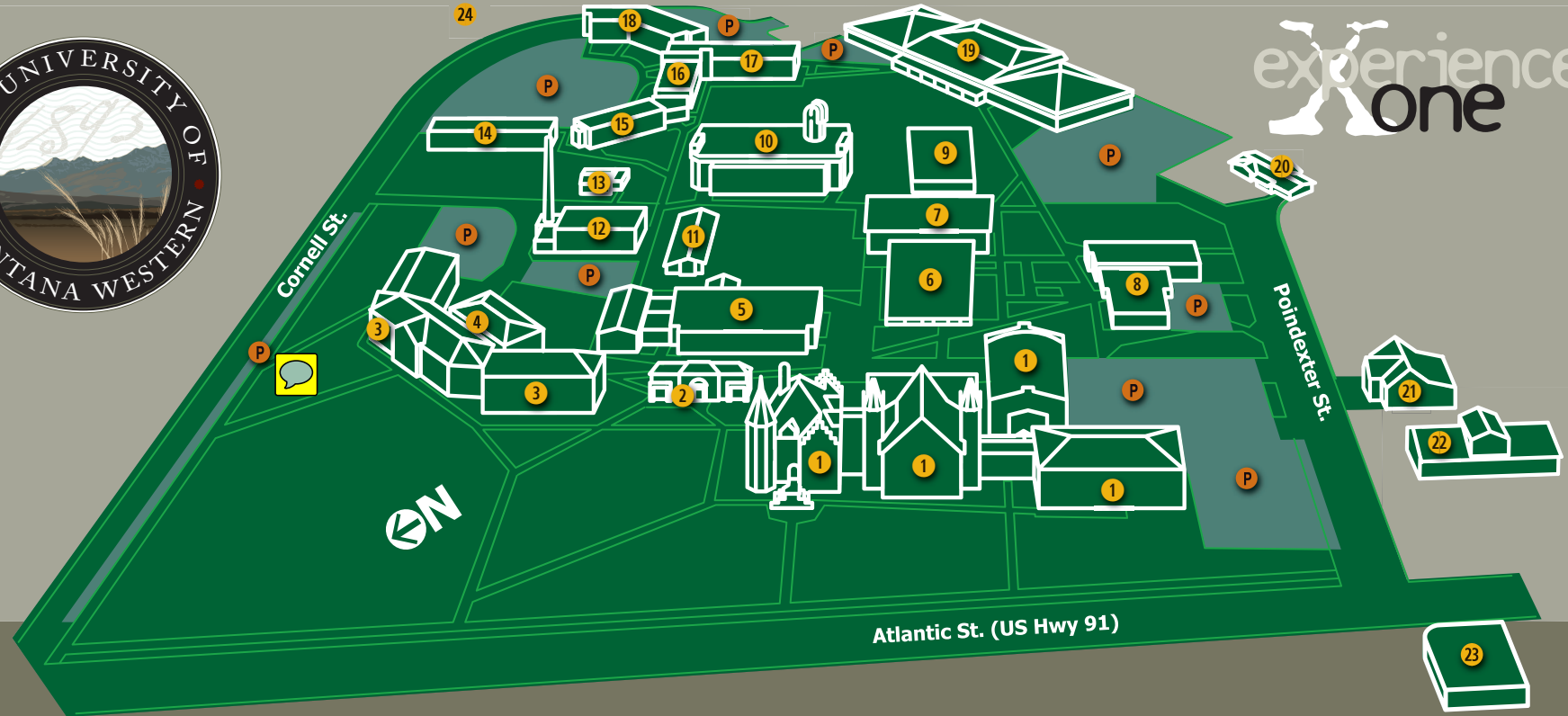

- 1 **MAIN HALL (1896):** UMW's first and most iconic building includes several additions to the original structure, all of which are part of an ongoing restoration project. In addition to classrooms, Main Hall houses the Departments of Education, English and Fine Arts as well as the Office of the Provost, the School of Outreach, Academic Advising, Student Success, TRiO, the Beier Auditorium, the Small Auditorium, and the UMW Art Gallery.
- 2 **ROE HOUSE (1912):** Former home of Margaret and Joe Roe, the Roe House was originally located 28 miles south of Dillon. Media mogul Ted Turner later purchased the house and donated it to Montana Western in 1998. After its relocation the house received a complete renovation funded by Mrs. Roe. The Roe House is now home to the Office of the Chancellor, the Montana Western Foundation, Alumni Relations, and University Relations.
- 3 **MATHEWS RESIDENCE HALL (1919):** Originally the Women's Residence Hall, Mathews Hall was dedicated in 1981 to honor longtime campus employee Georgia Mathews. The Lewis and Clark Banquet Room and the Heritage Room are both located in Mathews. The UMW Dining Hall is also connected to Mathews.
- 4 **DINING HALL (1921)**
- 5 **BUSINESS AND TECHNOLOGY BUILDING (1924):** Originally the college's first gym, this building now houses the Business and Technology Department, the Center for Service Learning, and Montana Youth Challenge classrooms and faculty offices.
- 6 **SHORT CENTER (1969):** The James Short Administrative Building houses the Offices of Admissions, the Registrar, the Vice Chancellor of Finance, the Business Office and the campus mail room.
- 7 **CARSON LIBRARY (1969):** The Lucy Carson Library and Media Center was named after a longtime UMW English professor. The building contains two levels and is connected to the Swysgood Technology Center.
- 8 **STUDENT UNION BUILDING (1958):** The Student Union Building houses the Campus Bookstore, the Bark n' Bite convenience store, KDWG Radio, the Department of History, Philosophy and Social Sciences, the Student Senate offices, a student lounge, conference room, game room and Stageline Pizza.
- 9 **SWYSGOOD TECHNOLOGY CENTER (2001):** The 23,000-square foot STC is the newest building on campus. The STC houses computer labs, meeting spaces, smart classrooms and printing facilities. The STC Great Room and Conference Room are located in the top floor. The STC Computer Technology Center and Audio/Visual Office are located on the main floor. The university's coffee shop, The Cup, is located in the lower level.
- 10 **BLOCK HALL (1971):** Block Hall honors longtime UMW science professor Daniel G. Block. It houses the Departments of Biology, Environmental Sciences, and Mathematics, as well as laboratories, Information Technology Services and a Apple Macintosh lab.
- 11 **FACILITIES SERVICES:** This building is the home of the Facilities Services Administrative Offices.
- 12 **HEATING PLANT/BIO MASS BOILER (1926):** In 2007, UMW converted the campus heating plant into a wood chip-fueled biomass boiler. This low-emissions boiler provides nearly 70 percent of the heat and hot water for campus while annually removing over 1,000 million tons of CO<sup>2</sup> from the atmosphere and saving over \$100,000.
- 13 **CURIOUS MINDS EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION CENTER:** The Center offers campus-based developmental childcare for children ages three to eight. Curious Minds services are offered to children of UMW students, faculty, staff, and the Dillon community. Curious Minds is also a model lab setting for UMW early childhood education students.
- 14 **FAMILY HOUSING (1958):** Family Housing features 16 one- and two-bedroom apartments.
- 15 **JORDAN RESIDENCE HALL (1958):** This building honors UMW's sixth president, Rush Jordan.
- 16 **DAVIS RESIDENCE HALL (1959):** Davis Hall originally housed 90 students. The building is named after former UMW president Sheldon E. Davis. Davis Hall houses the Offices of the Dean of Students, Residence Life, Health Services, Disability Services and Campus Counseling.
- 17 **CENTENNIAL RESIDENCE HALL (1964)**
- 18 **CLARK RESIDENCE HALL (1967):** Houses the Montana Youth Challenge program.
- 19 **BULLDOG ATHLETIC AND RECREATION CENTER (BARC):** The BARC is the center of athletic activity on campus. It houses the Straugh Gymnasium; the Keltz Arena; the Stauffer Conference Room; an upstairs gymnasium; weight, training, cardio, and aerobics rooms; racquetball courts; classrooms; the athletic director's office; and athletic department and HHP offices.
- 20 **CHANCELLOR'S RESIDENCE (1958)**
- 21 **LA CENSE CENTER OF EQUINE STUDIES:** Named to acknowledge the working partnership between the equine studies program and La Cense Montana, the program's main office is located here.
- 22 **SOUTH CAMPUS HOUSING**
- 23 **FINE ARTS ANNEX:** The annex contains the sculpture, glass blowing, and ceramics facilities for the Fine Arts Department.
- 24 **CAMPUS COMMUNITY GARDEN:** The garden serves as a learning center for sustainable, local agriculture and renewable energy. Garden plots are also available to members of the UMW and Dillon communities.
